Oceanographers use science and mathematics to study and explain the complex interactions between seawater, fresh water, polar ice caps, the atmosphere and the biosphere.





Politics Conference Trip

On Monday, myself and lots of other Politics students got the chance to attend the Polecon Student Conference in Westminster. The subject line of the conference read "The State of the State," and even with this warning, this event certainly managed to highlight just how divided the UK political spectrum has become. This conference could not have come at a more tumultuous yet relevant time. With world order in disarray and right-wing populism reaching ever greater heights, it's fair to say there was much to discuss. We heard from many voices across the landscape of UK politics, bringing to life the figures of our textbooks and giving us the unprecedented chance to engage with a vast array of opinions. Each speaker gave a 15-minute speech and then opened the floor to questions. With around 2,000 students in attendance and only 4 microphones, this quickly became a rather lively affair.

First to speak was the infamous Sir Jacob Rees-Mogg, the former Conservative MP, who impressed us all with his eloquent yet argumentative style of address. While his opinions, particularly on abortion and gay marriage, were largely ill-received by the rowdy audience, it is undeniable that he exuded political skill in every regard. This was followed by Richard Tice, former leader of Reform UK, another controversial figure. His grand, sweeping (rather hopeful) proclamations about the future of his party were much of the same Reform UK rhetoric we have become well acquainted with in recent months. Then we were graced with the presence of three notable women from the left-wing of our political spectrum. While Sian Berry (Green Party MP) and Daisy Cooper (Deputy Leader of the Lib Dems) offered perspectives from the smaller parties, which have been growing in popularity in recent years, Emily Thornberry (current Labour MP, serving as Chair of the Foreign Affairs Select Committee) gave us insight into the workings of the current government and their attempts to deal with the turbulent international circumstances created by the Trump administration and its evident affinity for the Kremlin.

This was succeeded by an address from the inspirational Lord Dubs. Many among us were deeply moved by his thoughtful and emotive discussion on the rights of asylum seekers, his passion for the subject sparked by his survival of the Holocaust. He fled Germany at 6 years old in 1939 on a Kindertransport train, leaving many of us to deeply reflect upon our privilege and the ever-present evils of fascism. A few speakers, such as SNP's Stephen Flynn, passed without consequence, but then it was time for the big event. The event every devout Politics student had been waiting for. The man that made the room hum with anticipation from the moment he entered – Alastair Campbell. He has achieved celebrity status among politically engaged circles, not simply for his significant involvement in Tony Blair's 'New Labour' government, but also for his very successful podcast, The Rest Is Politics, which he hosts alongside Rory Stewart. With his days of active politics behind him, he was free to offer honest and candid views on the "state of the State." He capitalized on this frequently, offering candidly pessimistic views on the new US presidency.


On this note, the conference was brought to a close, but we weren't done just yet. We attended Campbell's book signing and even got the chance to meet him, or in Mr. Carter's case, shake his hand. As you can see by his face in the picture, this excited him immensely. Overall, this conference was an interesting and invaluable experience, and I am sure all the Year 12s are looking forward to attending next academic year.

Punctuality

Punctuality Good punctuality to both lessons and to school is expected of all students. We know that employers place great importance on punctuality and attendance, therefore it is important for our students to understand the value of being on time.

WHSG will issue same day, 20 min detentions for students that are late into school, without a valid reason or persistent lateness to classes. Parents and students will be notified as soon as possible of the detention and the reasoning by email.

We ask that parents support these actions as important processes for the school and understand that detentions cannot be moved for any after school clubs or enrichment events. Should a detention clash with a medical appointment, evidence will be requested for the school to show flexibility.
