Message from the Headteacher



Dear Parents and Carers,

Our open evening is on July 4th, and we have over 400 students who have signed up to support us on the evening. This is a fabulous example of community spirit and service towards this important school event.

The Wallington Walk has now raised over £13K - this is phenomenal, well done to everyone. You can still contribute towards our science lab's refurbishment through ParentPay.

Year 10 start their exams this week and we wish them well. If you feel your child is anxious or start feeling a bit overwhelmed do contact the school and speak to their tutor.

The Sixth Form environment prefects and I went to a local garden centre yesterday to collect plants in the 'House Colours' for all Year 7 students to nurture until our greenhouse arrives, and all year 8 have been given clay pots to decorate – seeds will follow!

The CCF Sixth Form team and I have been meeting to talk about Tuesdays next year. We will run CCF activity after our fortnightly Tuesday early finish and there will be planned activities for these afternoons before students travel to Wilson's. The exact schedules of all the other clubs that run on Tuesdays are being reviewed and details will follow.

Happy Pride Month. To coincide with this, we are opening the Pride Soc to students in Year 9 and above. Pride Soc is a relaxed LGBTQ+ friendly and supportive environment for students to spend time with their peers and share their thoughts. We also have Pride themed Art competition running and a Pride poetry competition — both of which close on 28th June, with prizes for the winners. Our Pride month celebrations are also being incorporated into the 'Cultural and Identity' non-uniform day on Thursday 27th June.

Headteacher's Parent Questionnaire Response - May 2024

Parent Questionnaire Response - May 2024

Thank you for filling in the parent questionnaire that came out a few weeks ago. 525 of you completed the questionnaire, which is enough for us to get a real sense of your feelings towards the school. I thought it would be useful for me to comment on some of the questions.

83% agreed that 'the school curriculum encourages my child in learning'.

85% agreed that 'my child is becoming an independent learner'.

81% agreed that 'my child is making good progress'.

Interestingly for this last one, 13% of responses declared 'no opinion'. We are very proud of the results our students achieve. At GCSE we have a 'progress 8' measure of 0.93 which means that most of our students achieve a whole grade higher in their GCSEs, than their Key Stage 2 tests have predicted. Our latest data shows that 93% of students are achieving expected or higher progress in Year 7, in Year 8 the figure is 95% and in Year 9, it is 96%. This pattern shows our students make better progress year on year as they move through the school. At A Level we are predicting 81% A*/B with 57% of those grades at A and above.

82% agreed that 'the school expects my child to work hard'. This is good to see, as we have very high expectations of our students ensuring they work hard in lessons and on their homework.

75% agreed that 'my child enjoys reading at home'. All the research into reading and academic success suggests a strong relationship between the two. Added to that, reading gives children a greater understanding of the world, exposes them to new places and cultures and equips them with a rich and varied vocabulary. Please continue to encourage your child to read at home, ask them regularly what they are reading and what they are enjoying about the books.

61% agree that 'the schools assessment system is helping my child to make progress'. We are currently embedding a new approach to assessment that places greater emphasis on progress and moving learning forward, rather than grades. It will take time to embed fully and involve a shift in views about testing, but we are pleased that this change has been acknowledged by student surveys which have reported a significant increase in teachers checking for understanding in class. We will continue to discuss this topic with students and our parent focus group. Our assessment policy detailing our approach can be found here.

87% agree 'my child feels safe at school', but 4% disagree. I hope that if you are one of the respondents who disagreed, you have spoken with us at school, particularly the form tutor who knows your child the best.

80% agree 'my child is happy at school'. Again, if your child is unhappy, please let us know and we can try and work together to help address this.



82% agree 'the school teaches my child to recognise risks to their wellbeing – both online and offline'. 14% have no opinion which suggests that some parents/carers are not aware of the things we do to teach students to recognise the risks in this area. This is covered in PSHCE, workshops, assemblies, displays and items included in the Student Bulletin.

68% agree 'behaviour in the school is excellent', with no opinion at 21%. This year we have sent out surveys to staff and students asking for their opinions on behaviour in school and 81% of staff said that behaviour has improved in comparison to last academic year and 62% of students agreed with this.

87% agree 'my child has a positive attitude to learning'.

Though this is high, we continue to encourage our students to want to work hard, not just because they want good grades, but also because they enjoy their learning and their subjects, and that they want to really master the curriculums they are studying.



Finally, 71% agreed 'the school is well led and managed'. I would hope to see this increase year on year and am always available to listen to feedback on what we could do even better to serve our students and the community.

Thank you to all of you who responded to the questionnaire. I plan to run this annually, and by responding in this much detail, and addressing your responses each year, we continue to improve.

72% agreed 'my child is being prepared for the next stage of their learning', though 14% said they had no opinion. We pride ourselves on our transition work from year 6 to 7, from year 9 to 10, from 11 to 12 and post 16 with our excellent careers programme. Please do look at our website here for further details. 35% have no opinion on whether the 'school provides an effective careers programme that offers advice, experience and contact with employers', again please do look at our offer and careers provision on our website. Benchmarking against other schools nationally we are significantly above other schools for the provision for our students in terms of careers and next steps.

Many of you said you had no strong opinion about knowing our Special needs Coordinator (SENDCo), or what support is available to you. Our SENDCo is Mrs. Bates, who works with our dedicated SEND team. We also have an Assistant SENDCo, a Learning Support Assistant and an Inclusion Officer. We work hard to ensure our curriculum is inclusive for all students.
